

City of Boston Community Benefits Report

Process Summary

The Office of Government and Community Relations at Tufts University collected data on programs, volunteer efforts, donations, and services that faculty, staff, and students provided to the City of Boston and/or its residents during calendar year 2021. This includes financial aid grants for students from Boston that are solely based on need and do not need to be repaid. The data on the following pages is separated by schools and departments. For volunteer service, the dollar value was calculated using the Independent Sector's 2021 valuation (\$28.54/hour).

Tufts University's benefits contribution to the City of Boston that is calculated in this report is \$12,895,121.

The following are not included in the final benefits contribution, but are important to note for Calendar Year 2021.

- Tufts University paid \$33,303.14 in property taxes to the City of Boston in 2021.
- Tufts University paid the City of Boston \$450,000 in PILOT payments.
- 3,300 Tufts University alumni live in the City of Boston.
- 576 Tufts University employees live in the City of Boston, with a combined salary of \$43,190,087 annually (as of November 2021).

Geriatric Outreach Rotation	The Geriatric Community Service-Learning Rotation is a socially responsible program that enhances the wellbeing and the overall health of adults over the age of 50 in the Boston area.
