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
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# WHAT IS YOUTHWORKS?


YouthWorks is a state-funded youth employment program that helps teens and young adults get the skills and experience needed to find and keep jobs. Participants take part in paid short-term work placements during the summer and/or school year at public, private, and non-profit worksites. The program serves income-eligible teens and young adults aged 14 to 21 living in targeted cities across Massachusetts.

# WHO PARTICIPATED IN YOUTHWORKS 2016?


4,658 youth in over 31 cities in Massachusetts successfully completed summer employment opportunities as part of the 2016 YouthWorks program. Most participants were in school and placed in the non-profit and public sectors. Close to seventy percent of all summer job program participants were African-American or Hispanic.

# **OVERVIEW OF YOUTHWORKS—STATE-FUNDED YOUTH JOBS PROGRAM**

This report has three sections. The first includes an overview of YouthWorks; the second section highlights youth participants in program snapshots; the third section provides statewide and local statistical profiles of participants in the Summer 2016 YouthWorks program.

# **LEGISLATIVE CONTEXT**

A YouthWorks appropriation of \$11.5M was included in the FY16 budget as a line item. The FY2016 budget for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts included the following line item:

Line Item No. 7002–0012 of the FY2016 budget provided:

For a youth-at-risk program targeted at reducing juvenile delinquency in high risk areas of the commonwealth; provided that these funds may be expended for the development and implementation of a summer and year-round employment program for at-risk youth; provided further, that \$500,000 of these funds shall be matched by private organizations; provided further that these funds shall be available for expenditure through September 2, 2016. \$11,500,000

# **PROGRAM RESULTS**

**Table One** (page 8) presents summary statewide information on the funding allocations provided to eligible areas and on summer program participation. Allocations for the YouthWorks summer program were distributed to eligible cities using a formula that incorporates the relative share of youth aged 14–21 who live below the poverty level, using data from the American Community Survey.

Local program allocations for the summer of 2016 totaled approximately \$10M. The remaining funding provided in the FY2016 budget was allocated to year-round programs in the 2016-2017 fall through spring period. The year-round program will place approximately 350 teens and young adults.

The statewide and local statistical profiles contain more detailed data on the demographic background and characteristics of YouthWorks participants.

All participant data presented in the state and local statistical profiles represent information reported by local communities through Commonwealth Corporation's YouthWorks database. Each analytical table includes all data reported for participants in the region. Not all information was reported for every youth partipant.

# **BASIC FEATURES OF YOUTHWORKS PROGRAM**

**Eligibility to Apply for Funds:** The YouthWorks Program was limited to the 31 cities with the highest number of youth in poverty–cities and towns where low-income youth are especially in need of summer job opportunities. Targeted cities and the workforce investment board where those cities are located work together to design the application and manage local YouthWorks programs. This partnership helps encourage local communities to coordinate the summer jobs resources with broader youth strategies.

**Eligibility of Youth to Participate:** Participation in the YouthWorks program is open to youth aged 14-21 whose family income for the most recent six-month period does not exceed the annual equivalent to be eligible to receive a free or reduced lunch in the National School Lunch Program. This is approximately equivalent to an annual income of just under \$48,000 for a family of four (income thresholds vary by family size). YouthWorks partners were asked to focus 20% of their targeted job opportunities to vulnerable youth who include young people facing the following barriers:

- » Court-involved youth (on juvenile probation, gang involved, CRAs, juvenile arrest)
- » DYS Committed youth
- » Homelessness
- » Having aged out of foster care, or being close to aging out of foster care

In addition to targeting vulnerable youth for 20% of available placements, grantees were asked to recruit youth who demonstrate at least one additional risk factor beyond family income level. For purposes of this program, such risk factors were defined as:

- » Poor academic performance or a school dropout
- » Being the child of a single parent
- » Having disabilities or special needs
- » Lack of fluency in English
- » Being a teen parent

The numbers and percentages of youth with these risk factors are included in the state and local statistical profiles.

**Program Activities:** The primary component of the YouthWorks program is subsidized employment and work-readiness training. Work placements can be made at public agencies, departments and authorities, non-profit organizations, and private-sector settings. Participants are employed up to 30 hours per week over a six or seven-week period during the summer.

Participants could be employed in the summer component beginning as early as June 1, 2016, and ending as late as September 2, 2016. Hourly wages were required to be no less than the Massachusetts minimum wage of \$10.00 per hour.

In addition to funding local workforce agencies to pay wages and stipends for jobs, Youth-Works provides funds for program operators to conduct employer outreach and engagement, youth recruitment, and supervision of youth on the job.

**Work-Readiness Curriculum and Assessment:** All workforce areas that receive YouthWorks funding are required to use a structured work-readiness curriculum that builds an essential body of skills and knowledge valued by employers. The curriculum, called Signal Success, is a hands-on workshop-based program that supports young people's success in getting and keeping a job.

Training workshops and coaching for program staff on using the curriculum in YouthWorks programs is conducted annually. All YouthWorks youth participants were required to complete a work-readiness portfolio.

**Program Staffing:** YouthWorks partners were required to ensure that youth placed in job sites received adequate supervision; localities were permitted to hire and assign staff as worksite supervisors and case managers.

Allowable Expenditures: Not less than 65% of the total funds provided under this program were required to be spent on wages and stipends paid to eligible youth. Up to 30% of the total funds provided under this program could be spent on salaries and related personnel costs of out-reach, counseling, instructional and job site supervisory staff; and instructional materials. Each grant recipient was permitted to retain no more than 5% of its grant funds for local management, oversight, reporting and record keeping, and monitoring.

**Private-Sector Match:** The YouthWorks appropriations in the 2016 program required a \$500,000 match from private sector sources. Overall, communities counted over \$2,340,000 in local matching funds.

# BERKSHIRE

# **Cranwell Spa and Golf Resort**

Nestled into a leafy hilltop, the Cranwell Spa and Golf Resort is a luxury destination for visitors from the Berkshires and well beyond. Emma Bordon (16) and Shaleir Jackson (17) contributed to the Resort's customer service experience by sharing shifts in the spa locker room and in laundry services supporting over 300 visitors. They got along well with staff and quests and are looking forward to working at the Spa part-time after school.

"We are helping out—the place needs many employees. We are helping staff do jobs people just don't have time for," explained Shaleir. Both young women are learning customer service and teamwork skills. Problem solving is also needed at this job, "we get asked a lot of questions!" remarked Emma. They especially enjoy seeing 'regulars'. Shaleir saved her earnings for a device and clothes; Emma is saving for a car.





# **Berkshire Medical Center (BMC)**

BMC is a 220-bed community teaching hospital in Pittsfield affiliated with the University of Massachusetts Medical School. Julie Hinckley, a BMC staff person in charge of volunteers, supervised Katelynn Lauren (16) this summer. Katelynn worked in dialysis helping to transport patients, field phone calls, make appointments, and do data entry. In addition she helped clinical staff assemble equipment and helped to run blood tests for 30 people per shift.

Katelynn attends a tech high school and is concentrating in Spanish, however she wants to go into nursing. Besides learning what people do on the dialysis unit, her Youth-Works job helped her learn about the importance of following directions. She observed, "Schedules and procedures are really important here. I help them to not get behind they always tell me this really helps."

# HULL AND RANDOLPH

# **Riddles Supermarket, Hull**

Thomas Netsongtat (19), a rising senior at Hull High School, had his second job in the YouthWorks program at Riddles Supermarket. His first job was a dishwasher—a job he described as 'tough' because there is not much else to do besides dishwashing. He liked his job at Riddles because there was a lot of variety— he could finish a task and find something else to do. He bagged and cleaned up and was trained on the register. Without this job he would have stayed home with nothing much to do. He's saving his money and spending a little on school clothes so his aunt won't have to spend on him. He wanted to help her out.





# Charley's Philly Steaks, South Shore Plaza

"I'm from Randolph and I want to hire from Randolph," explained William Yoo, owner of Charley's Philly Steaks at the South Shore Plaza Food Court. He prefers to hire young people who don't have work experience—they tend to stay longer and are not likely to bring bad habits with them like being on phones and not showing up.

Chinedu Ibial (18) had her first real job at Charley's. She worked hard as a cashier and all-round team player as part of the small crew that runs the store. She learned a lot about working and retail including the art of the upsell. "They key is to mention at least three options, not just 'would you like fries or a drink with that?' It's 'would you like cheese, fries, or a lemonade with that order?' They talk about these skills at team meetings," she explained.

Chinedu liked getting to know people as part of her job. She says she was pretty shy when she started but has learned to communicate better, the more she talks with people. She will start college in the fall and looks forward to working part-time at Charley's.



# **SPRINGFIELD, CHICOPEE & HOLYOKE**



# Digital Boombox Network, Springfield

"When I heard we had to do live radio, I was like I don't know if I can sign up for this. After our 3rd show, it feels like forever; we are used to it," explained Shania Kosenko (17) about her experience at Digital Boombox Network. The Slay Team, made up of Ariana Ortiz (15), Alyssa Ortiz (20), Araya Henderson (16) and Shania, did live radio shows for teens three times a week at the online hip hop radio station run by sisters Billy Jean Belvin and Dhandeaka Harris.

The teens were in charge of building a fan base, showcasing local talent and talking up community events. Dhandeaka explained the idea behind hiring the teens for the summer. "We wanted the teens to help us reach younger audience and help us go viral. It's got to be more than loud and fun. It's got to be professional and researched."

## Good Dog Spot, Chicopee

Javier Vazquez (18) had just graduated Chicopee Comprehensive High School with plans to do the veterinary technician program at Holyoke Community College when he was placed at Good Dog Spot—a grooming and daycare service for dogs. At the height of the summer, he had his hands full with the 45 dogs in the sprawling facility. "It's crazy busy, but I can do the work and be a help to my boss on Saturdays," he remarked. Javier liked learning about all types of dogs and he was trained to give dogs medications if they needed them.





#### Holyoke Urban Bike School, Holyoke

Gabriel Fernandez (14) and Joseph Matos (15) loved going to work at the Holyoke Urban Bike School (HUBS) run through the Greater Holyoke YMCA. They felt they contributed to the mission and did a little bit of everything including marketing and outreach projects, fixing bikes, and teaching bike repair to 9-12 year olds. Their supervisor, HUBS coordinator Colby Singleton, gave them high marks for their focus, motivation, and work ethic. This was Colby's first chance to work with young interns and she was pleased with the progression of skill building. Colby and other staff at local bike shops have a vision to build a region-wide training program to help young people develop marketable skills and get work in bike repair.

# **BROCKTON & LYNN**

# Copeland Toyota, Brockton

Dave MacCormick, parts & service director at Copeland Toyota, was new to the Youth-Works program this summer and loved the idea of giving back to the community and having young people who can fill many roles around the enterprise. He looks for young people who are ready to work. Josh Tavares (18) did a variety of tasks– cleaning up the service area, landscaping the sprawling property, and making sure care stations had the supplies they needed.

Govanna Henry (18) detailed cars—the site had up to 30 cars per day. Her boss said she was excellent at customer services and was able to interact comfortably with everyone—particularly the Haitian-Creole speaking population.





# The REAL Program, Lynn

Busayna Abdelkarim spent her summer at The REAL Program, a Lynn non-profit that addresses literacy issues by providing books, homework assistance, and enrichment opportunities for children. When REAL founder/director Jan Plourde found out that Busayna was a Sudanese refugee, she immediately said "I'll take her."

Jan could tell she would be a role model for children. Busayna works with children ages 6-13 at the summer camp with focus on reading, art, and science. Most children are not English-speaking. She articulated her strength at this job, "I understand what they need and what will make them listen to me."

#### Lynn Economic Opportunity, Inc.

"You have to listen, if you don't listen—it's on you. We don't want to make mistakes—it means someone won't get electricity or oil. Communication is important," explained Abitalib Girdia (19). Abitalib was one of a group of teens doing administrative projects at Lynn Economic Opportunity, Inc. (LEO), a comprehensive human service organization this summer as part of YouthWorks.





# WORCESTER



#### Worcester City Hall

Erin Arvizu, Chief Accountant in the Treasurer's office at Worcester City Hall, needed help scanning documents and other tasks necessary to close the books on the city's 60 plus banking accounts. She was happy to have the help of YouthWorks participant Quentin Petrallo (16) who helped with daily leger and cash updates. "We have a lot to get done and Quentin's made our lives easier," she explained.

Quentin, who wants to study micro economics in college, got up and came to work. "I asked questions if I didn't understand something. I also asked about the purpose of what I was doing to learn more about the operations. I now know how to look for work and I know I can get the job done," he said about his experience.

#### **Alpha Travel**

In the insurance and travel business for 24 years, Yolanda Villamil looks for staff with attitude and confidence and the ability to follow and accept rules. "They need to be willing to learn—I want to see that they take notes and are willing to practice on the software. If they can handle a very fast-paced environment and remain friendly—they are a fit," she elaborated.

Delmalyz Bernardi (17), a rising senior at North High, got her certificate for selling insurance as part of her job placement at Alpha Travel. She was able to provide quotes for auto insurance and learned how to talk to people and understand their needs, "Before this job I was not very comfortable taking to strangers. I understand I have to talk to people with respect." She also improved her financial literacy, "I was a big spender, now I have learned to budget. I've also learned more math here and am better with numbers."

# LOWELL

#### Walgreens

"She came in, we showed her a planogram and she stocked the shelved perfectly. We love her," Tracy Trippleton, Lowell Walgreens store manager, said about Kendra Kim (18). Tracy explained what traits she looked for in a new hire: a nice personality and a smile and a person willing to learn new things; someone who shows up and takes the job seriously. Kendra, who plans to go to UMass Lowell for nursing learned that communication and time management are crucial work skills. She was excited that she will be hired as a result of the program.





# **Mill City Grows**

The J Squad spent the summer growing produce in local Lowell community gardens, working the mobile farmers market, and understanding the meaning of food justice. "It's making sure that people have affordable fresh food that doesn't have to travel for 11 months before it gets to the store," said Lytton Chea (16).





## Food for the World/Essex Art Center

The "Food for the World" mural was the latest installation in the Summer Mural Program, a collaborative effort by the ValleyWorks Career Center and the Essex Art Center. The mural was hosted by Food for the World–a pantry that gives away high-protein, nutritious food to over 500 people a week. All five Food for the World pantries – four in Lawrence and one in Salem, Massachusetts – feed 2,775 people a week. Jason Asselin, lead mural artist and art professor at Salem State University gave the group practical and life lessons, "I like them to experiment and see what works; if they have a question about technique we practice it and they do it. Mistakes can turn out to be beautiful. It breaks the fear of painting."






# Lawrence General Hospital



#### Total Number of Youth Served in 2016: 4,658


#### School Status of YouthWorks Participants (Missing data 2%)




#### Grade Level of YouthWorks Participants (Missing data 7%)






#### School Status of YouthWorks Participants




# Grade Level of YouthWorks Participants





#### Total Number of Youth Served in 2016: 1,539


#### School Status of YouthWorks Participants (Missing data 5%)




#### Grade Level of YouthWorks Participants (Missing data 14%)




#### Grade Level of YouthWorks Participants


#### Grade Level of YouthWorks Participants


